

Nenda – Gikendan Noopiming gaye Nibiing

("seeking knowledge in the woods and place of water")

Natural Resources Tribal Youth Camp

August 4th - 8th, 2025

Q: "Does camp cost anything to attend?"

A: Gaawiin! Camp *Nenda* is FREE! All expenses for lodging, food and activities are included for all youth participants.

Q: "Do I have to be enrolled in a tribe to apply and participate in the 1854's summer youth camp?" A: Gaawiin! Any youth that is **affiliated** with a tribe is encouraged to apply, including descendants.

Q: "Is Nenda – Gikendan Noopiming gaye Nibiing a day camp?"

A: Gaawiin! 1854's summer youth camp is a week-long, overnight camp. Parents/guardians are only responsible for dropping off and picking up youth participants from a common meeting place on travel days, Monday August 4th and Friday August 8th. Camp will be held at the Hubachek Wilderness Research Center in Ely, MN. All other transportation to activity sites will be provided.

Q: "When are applications due?"

A: Applications to participate in camp *Nenda* – *Gikendan Noopiming gaye Nibiing* are due **Monday July** 7th, 2025. All the application materials can be found on the 1854 Treaty Authority website.

Q: "Do I really need to write an essay in my application form?"

A: Mii-gwayak (that's correct). How are we supposed to know that you are *serious* and want to join the fun? If writing is not your thing, feel free to express your interest in another format (artwork, photos, etc)

Q: "My kid is entering 10th grade – are they old enough to attend?"

A: Yes! Tribal youth entering high school, grades 9th through 12th grade are welcome and encouraged to apply to attend camp *Nenda*. Younger candidates may be considered.

Q: "I can't drop my youth off for camp, are there any other options for transportation to camp?"
A: Yes! Contact coordinator Marne Kaeske to discussion options for how to enable your youth to attend: 218-481-7018

Q: "What activities are planned to take place during camp?"

Swimming - Fishing - Campfires - FUN

A: Including but not limited to:

- -Meet a conservation law enforcement K9 unit
- -Participate in on-the-water surveys: manoomin density, electrofishing demonstration
- -Introduction to a Tribal community-based archeology field school and indigenous geographies
- -Ishkode! (fire): fighting fire with fire (prescribed burning, tackling federal wild fires, etc)
- -A visit to the International Wolf Center and discussion with Anishinaabe elder
- -One-on-one range practice (shooting)
- -Investigate deer/moose/wolf interaction and investigate parasite transmission in a laboratory
- -"A day in the life..." discussions with professionals (ex: hot shot fire crew, Tribal liaisons)
- -Connect with exciting college natural resource programs
